The Word "Church"

Beginning a series of taped lectures done in about 1980, the late Fr. Roland F. Palmer, SSJE spoke at length about the title page of our Prayer Book. I have to say that, when I first listened to the lectures, I was utterly amazed at what he drew out of the title.

Notable was the attention that he paid to the triple use of the word "Church".

Fr. Palmer spoke of the fact that the BCP and the Sacraments were rooted in the Church—the big Church the Church Catholic.

We use these in the context of a more local Church—the Anglican Church of Canada or we would say to-day, the Traditional Anglican Church of Canada. The use of the word "Church" was refined

even more in the title to refer to the very places and congregations where people used the BCP and celebrated the Sacraments.

Have you ever thought of the origin of our English word "church" or the similar Scots word "kirk"?

They do have a connection to our faith.

At the Eucharist and elsewhere we say or sing the "Kyries"—Kyrie eleison, Christe eleison, Kyrie eleison. Or in English—Lord have mercy upon us, Christ have mercy upon us, Lord have mercy upon us.

We speak of our Lord Jesus Christ.

In a lengthy discussion on the phrase in the Creed, "The

Holy Catholic Church" the 17th century Bishop John Pearson of Chester in his wonderful Exposition of the Creed draws attention to this and make the point that the word Kuploo-Kyriosmeans "the Lord" "and that properly Christ: from whence Κυριακός.-belonging to the Lord Christ." He writes, "If we look upon the old English word now in use, "church " or "kirk," it is derived from the Greek, and first signified "the house of the Lord," that is, of Christ, and from thence was taken to signify the people of God, meeting in the house of God."

The very word "Church" reminds us always of our Lord Jesus Christ.
